"Peatland Restoration Showcase"

Barry Dunne – Peatland Action

Outline: Restoration of our degraded peatlands can deliver a wide range of benefits for the communities, economy and environment of Scotland. In this session, we'll look at WHY we need to restore peatlands, HOW we do that, and WHO can get involved. We'll look at how we collaborate across the sector through the provision of advice, support and funding for land managers, agents and contractors. We will also highlight how we are looking to build resilience in the sector through the jobs/skills opportunities we provide for contractors, designers, agents and students.

"Biodiversity in Swards"

Dr Holly Nisbet – Re-Livestock Project

Outline: Multispecies swards (or "herbal lays") have many benefits, from increasing biodiversity to reducing artificial fertiliser requirements. In recent years, they have been proposed to result in reduced enteric methane from ruminants. Two trials carried out at SRUC's Dairy Research and Innovation Centre over the summers of 2025 and 2026 compared enteric methane emissions from 36 lactating Holstein cows grazing on plots consisting of either a monoculture of perennial ryegrass or a multispecies sward pasture. The cows were paired according to milk yield and separated into two groups, with one being assigned the perennial ryegrass pasture and the other the multispecies sward pasture.

Enteric methane measurements were recorded using GreenFeed units, allowing for comparisons between the two groups emissions to be explored.

"Valuing the Past in Future Landscapes"

Dr Marie Martin – D&G Council Archaeologist

Outline: This workshop will facilitate discussion of different perspectives on the historic environment in future land use and development projects. Future Horizon Sessions

"Community Benefits in Scotland's Restoration Market: What They Are and What They Do"

Andrew Irving, PhD Candidate based in the Centre for Sustainable Forests and Landscapes, University of Edinburgh

Outline: Land-use change toward restoration in Scotland is increasingly shaped by the development of market-based approaches to scaling nature recovery. Within this emerging natural capital market, projects generating and trading nature-based credits are expected to deliver benefits for local communities. Drawing on stakeholder interviews across policy, finance, landownership, project delivery and community organisations, alongside ongoing survey work with local residents, this presentation examines community benefits in two framings: operationally, what they are, the opportunities they present, and the constraints on delivery; and conceptually, what they do in bridging diverse stakeholder requirements, legitimising markets and shaping future rural landscapes.

"Youth Futures"

Centre for Mountain Studies, University of Highlands and Islands, Scottish Association for Marine Science

Outline: Youth Futures is an intergenerational dialogue between young people and decision makers, involving 58 students from Ullapool, Kinlochbervie and Farr High Schools and decision-makers in the NW2045 network of community bodies, landowners, businesses and agencies. We have gathered answers to those speech bubbles from relevant people with power to make decisions and influence change, and returned these to the young people. Our aim is to raise awareness of young people's concerns and generate hope that they will be listened to.

"The Natural Choice? Perceptions of the terms 'Nature-based' and 'Land-based' and the implication for careers"

Dr Megan Donald – Lantra

Outline: A look into research of young people's perceptions of land-based careers and the implications of these on the sector.

Biodiversity in Scottish plantation forests: what do experts actually agree on?

Lucy Jenner – Centre for Sustainable Forests and Landscapes, University of Edinburgh

This study used a two-round Delphi process to build expert consensus on biodiversity in Scottish plantation forests, before sharing findings with local stakeholders. Results reveal significant divergence between academic, practitioner, and forestry sector perspectives — with implications for how evidence is used in integrated, collaborative land management decisions.
